What I have learned

What have I learned in the past twelve months about Messy Church?

*Well, by nature, Messy Church will always be a work in progress and no two services will ever be the same.

*The two P's are vital for success - Prayer and Planning.

*It is important to have good table leaders who can share their insights, encourage conversation and make contact with newcomers without running a full-scale Bible Study.

*Keep things running to time, but be prepared to be flexible - if the Spirit is moving during one segment, we might have to save a bit of time elsewhere.

*It is a privilege to be able offer people the opportunity to meet with God in a different way, especially those who don't have a history of attending church.

As an older congregation, our main challenge is to maintain our forward momentum as well as being mindful of the missional dimension of Messy Church as a



means of connecting with our surrounding community in general, and the younger generations in particular if our church is to survive and thrive into the future.
