The Corner, South Australia

Towards the end of last school term, the R.E Coordinator, a small team and Rev. M of the Crow's Nest Parish (a little bit west of Toowoomba) went "paddling in messy waters" when they gathered the R.E. classes from Crow's Nest and Goombungee schools to have a trial Messy Church. There were mixed feelings expressed by some team members: Would they be able to restore the church to order? What if it didn't work? However, it all went swimmingly. One helper said that she was so involved in the activity she was leading, she was disappointed when it was time to pack up. Another remarked that they must be "a real Messy Church now because of the specks of glitter in the carpet". But best of all, one of the children who had attended the session met Rev. M. in the street some time later. "Gee, that was beaut. When can we do it again?" was his comment.

The Parable of the Potato


wonderful leaders. On the day of the first meeting, I was digging compost into the vegie garden which I had weeded 10 days prior. But there was one weed left, so I went to pull it out. It was growing near a potato plant, and when I pulled up the weed, at the base of the potato plant was ...you guessed it: a potato! "If there is one here, are there any others?" I wondered.


So I began to dig, and as I dug and dug, potatoes of all shapes and sizes appeared; some as small as a thumb nail, some medium and some larger, ending in a large container half full of potatoes. This may seem insignificant, but that day I experienced a revelation - a modern day parable. It was as if God was saying, "In the deep, dark places, where you may not water or nurture, places you don't even see, I am growing people of faith. Some have a little faith, some a medium amount and some a lot. You may not know about it, but they are mine, and it just requires someone to put the spade in and dig them up, to help them come together in a community." Is this not what Messy Church is about? Building and growing Christian community? This was amazing affirmation of the step we were taking, combined with the provision of a team of people to lead.

And so that night, we gathered. The concept of Messy Church was explained, and it was received with joy, excitement and anticipation by the team. With confidence in the grace and provision of God, we were ready to begin our Messy adventure together.
