Reflections on a Messy Baptism

The open and welcoming atmosphere, where creativity was really encouraged, and with children and adults alike being able to engage in worship at different levels made for such a positive experience. We felt that here was a community of faith we could really belong to and grow in, and that led us to ask about of having our daughter baptised. Samantha's baptism was a lovely celebration, which also coincided with the second birthday of Messy Church Ivanhoe. The service was themed "Welcome to God's Family".

Afterwards our wider family who had attended reflected on how inclusive, interactive and experiential Messy Church is. As a teacher, my father-in-law in particular found it touching to see how valued and appreciated the input of children was to the service.

The Messy Church approach of having a range of creative activities for all ages to explore the Christian story, a worship time and then opportunity to talk with others over a meal, provides an accessible alternative to the traditional approach to church services, and has been a really positive experience for our family.

Telling the Messy Church story

After the Brisbane floods, a young woman cutting my hair said that she had seen our Messy Church signboard. She asked if that meant our church had been flooded and we were calling on the local community for help! I explained to her, as best I could, that Messy Church is all about connecting with people and families that live on the "messy edge" of faith matters. Families that have little or no connection with the church are welcomed as equals, encouraged to be creative, engaged in celebrating what God has done and invited to eat together. Families that do not have to understand strange language, know when to sit or not sit, feel out of place, and worry about their children making a noise. Like my hairdresser, many people in traditional congregations may not understand what Messy Church is about - focusing on the "messy" aspect, rather than what it is really about in reaching people for Jesus.

A Wonderful Time with Jane!

Around 150 people from more than 35 churches had a wonderful time with Jane Leadbetter over the course of two days at St Matthew's Anglican Church, Sherwood (Queensland). The Saturday event focused on churches considering starting Messy Church and the Sunday event focused on Discipleship within Messy Church.




<u>Messy lyfe</u>
