St. Paul's, Albion Park (NSW) - Australia's first Catholic Messy Church

We began Messy Church one year ago. Some families haven't missed a Messy Church since. New families continue to join in, enjoy the experience and say they will be come back. Messy Church has been a great blessing to our parish.

Some things we have found over our Messy Church journey include...

- the sharing of resources makes Messy Church an opportunity for churches - no matter what their size or denomination - to join together and 'break down' some of the barriers that can often separate us
- Messy Church is only successful if you have a team and a
 pastor who share a passion for this ministry, and the project
 has the support of the Parish Pastoral Council and the wider
 parish
- As St. Paul says in one of his letters "there are a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there is all sorts of work to be done but always for the same Lord". This verse of scripture is lived out at every Messy Church as each member of the parish Messy Church team contributes to making the gathering a success.

Recently we hosted our first Messy Church workshop for interested pastors and members of local Catholic parishes. At this workshop our parish Messy Church coordinator and I invited those who attended to come and see Messy Church in action. About 3 Catholic parishes sent representatives to visit our first Messy Church for 2015 and are now considering 'signing up' and registering to start Messy Church in their own parish. Hopefully by Term 2, 2015 we will be able to say St. Paul's Albion Park is one of 3 or 4 Catholic Churches in Australia that has Messy Church.

One email that I received from a local Catholic pastor who attended summarises for me not only the conversion that people go through when they come to Messy Church but how this "ministry" can bring great blessings to any parish or congregation that gives it a go:

"I guess I was sceptical heading into today. At one level [I thought it would be] just a large play group. Yet it was also so much more. It was authentically church. And probably the only church experience that so many of the parents will have during the year. And for them it said that church was fun. Enjoyable. Life giving. Connected. Real. And clearly loved by the children. All of this makes Messy Church something that should be celebrated and tried"
