Messy Emmaus Labyrinth


One of the things that really struck me about our Emmaus Labyrinth is that it's a truly All-Age kind of worship. I took Sophia (aged nearly 4) through today and we read through the stations (with a bit of editing by me) and she engaged with all of the tasks. Here's her response to the station where you had to think about a time in your life that had been filled with sadness: a picture of our dog "Lulie" (Lucy) who died. When we got to the station where it was time to pray, she prayed that "God would look after Lulie, and Mummy's mummy and daddy who have died." We also had some wonderful feedback from adults who walked it and found it deeply moving - including some who emailed afterwards to say it had affected them profoundly. I'm thankful that we've been able to help people of all ages engage deeply and profoundly with God.

directions at Messy Church Logos. Note, too, that there is a new section of logos for use in Messy Churches outside of the UK.








Messy Church Theology – Book Review
