This is a question we now often hear from children coming to Messy Church. For us, last year was one of reviewing how we could best engage more families with the Gospel. When the concept of Messy Church was suggested, a small team of interested people was formed to investigate whether this was a possibility for our congregation. As a consequence of a resounding positive response, our journey of experimentation and implementation of Messy Church began. The result of this initial groundwork has been the establishment of Messy Church as an integral part of our outreach to the local community. At our monthly gatherings we have a regular attendance of between 60 and 85 people, the majority of whom are not currently members of our congregation. Children bring parents because they are excited about Messy Church, parents are enthusiastic and positive about experiencing church with a difference. Above all, we know God is directing this activity and we are excited and encouraged by the way in which God is so richly blessing this work.

## Engaging denominationally
